GREETINGS from the ACTING DEAN

Dear People of St. Paul's,

The Season of Eastertide is filled with joy, wonder, and new life. The disciples gathered in an upper room experienced joy in the presence of the risen Jesus (Luke 24:41). The two disciples returning from Emmaus to Jerusalem after their encounter with the risen Jesus said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" (Luke 24:32), and Peter was restored in his commission to build the church, hearing "Feed my sheep," through his encounter with the risen Jesus on the shore of the Sea of Tiberius (John 21:17).

Following wonderful Lent and Holy Week services, that attracted around 40% more people for in-person worship this year than in recent years, we now journey through forty days of the church calendar that will bring us to Ascension Day, Thursday May 18, and a further ten days to Pentecost Sunday, May 28.

On Ascension Day, Bishop Monnot will join us to preside and preach at a 7:00 pm Service of Holy Eucharist. We will kick off our evening together with a potluck supper at 5:30 pm (lasagna provided, please bring a side dish or a



dessert to share!) and a short presentation of Ascension-related fine art history at 6:00 pm after which we will move to the sanctuary for our service together at 7:00 pm.

Pentecost Sunday May 28 falls on Memorial Day weekend this year and we invite you to celebrate with any graduates among us, or families with graduates, or children making transitions from one school to another. Replanting Our Rain Garden – Saturday, May 13 Please note time change


Beginning at 2 p.m. the Youth Group under the leadership of Jonathan Hansen will gather in the Rain Garden and adult gardeners led by Elvin McDonald will coach the Youthful gardeners as they plant about 200 new native and worthy plants. All the transplants are herbaceous (i.e., not woody) and considered eligible for the Xeriscape landscape, a garden that does not require undue irrigation during normal times of dry weather. Each Youth will receive a brand new trowel to take home and we hope it will inspire their own gardening efforts.

St. Paul's Cathedral Arts Central College A Capella Choir Concert Sunday, May 14 at 4:00 p.m.



Upcoming Principal Feasts on Our Calendar

There are seven great feasts in the Church year: Easter, Ascension Day, The Day of Pentecost, Trinity Sunday, All Saints' Day, Christmas, and The Epiphany. Three are imminent, and our service plans are highlighted in this issue.

The Feast of the Ascension

Ascension Day, Thursday, May 18.

The observance of this feast is of great antiquity (perhaps dating to the 4th Century) and it marks the occasion on which the risen Christ is taken into heaven after appearing to his followers for forty days.

Potluck supper begins at 5:30 p.m.; lasagna will be provided, and parishioners are encouraged to bring a salad, side dish, or a dessert to share. At 6:00 p.m., Susie Messer will give an art history presentation, and Bishop Monnot will preside at our 7:00 p.m. Holy Eucharist.



Trinity Sunday celebrates "the one and equal glory" of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and calls us to acknowledge both the breadth of our experience of God and the limitations of our knowledge.


This day is notable for being the only major Christian festival that celebrates a *doctrine* of the church rather than an event in its sacred history. It is dedicated to the Christian belief in the Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – and falls on the Sunday following Pentecost each year. The belief of one God in three elements is distinctive of the Christian faith but the early church was plagued by contrary views. Trinity Sunday spread throughout the western church around the 14th century.

Pentecost takes place on the 50th day (the seventh Sunday) after Easter Sunday. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks (an agricultural event that focused on the harvesting of the first fruits), as described in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 2:1–31). Pentecost forcefully represents to us the work of the Spirit, which creates and re-creates communities of faith, even if it remains out of their control.

We will celebrate Pentecost at both services on Sunday, May 28, with special recognition of graduates and celebration cake following the 10:00 service. Please contact the Cathedral office to have your name or that of someone you know included in our recognition.

Priest Associate The Reverend Michael Monnot



Michael serves as an Associate priest at St. Paul's, having arrived at the Cathedral and in Des Moines late in 2022. Michael was born and raised in northern California and graduated with a

degree in History from UC Berkeley. While a young adult, he was employed in the graphics industry in the San Francisco Bay Area, mostly in small businesses, and spent some time as a small business owner himself. He gradually discerned a call to ministry in a local Episcopal church (St. James' in San Francisco), where he served as youth minister. He attended seminary at CDSP (Church Divinity School of the Pacific), where he met his wife, Betsey (yes, that would be Bishop Betsey!).

Michael was ordained a priest in 2005. His first call was as Assistant Rector at St. Patrick's, Kenwood. Later he served for sixteen years at All Saints' in Sacramento, first as co-rector with Betsey, and for the last five years, as rector. He also served for a number of years in various capacities for the Diocese of Northern California: as Campus Ministry coordinator for five years, and as a member of the Board of Trustees for six years and as vice-president of the Board for five years.



This year's Vacation Bible School will be July 24th-27th, 6pm-8pm. It will be for 3 year-olds, to 5th grade. Adult, Junior High, and High School volunteers are needed. Jonathan Hansen, MDiv **Formation Missioner**



Born in Iowa, Jonathan Hansen's family comes from Harlan, a small town in the western part of the state located in Shelby County, which his predecessors homesteaded eight


generations ago. During his high school years he acquired a piqued interest in Christian thought and devotion, which eventually spurred him on to pursue a seminary education at Spurgeon's College, London, a Baptist seminary, where he curiously became Episcopalian, upon first encountering progressive Christian theology, and the use of the Book of Common Prayer. After this transition, his home church of St Paul's, Harlan, and his pastor, Rev. Glenn Rankin recognized in him a potential call to priesthood, and, after a period of discernment, shipped him off to Austin, TX for further study at the Seminary of the Southwest.

After completion of his studies, Jonathan served briefly as a curate at St Paul's Cathedral, Des Moines, during which time he met his wife, who was passing through town on her way from Brooklyn, NY to San Francisco, CA. In keeping with traditional love stories, Jonathan's life promptly turned upsidedown. Hitching his wagon to her pony, he followed her to California where they grew organic vegetables for local restaurants, and a baby girl-Wilhelmina, the jewel of their lives. While there, Jonathan also studied finish carpentry, and served as a lay-pastor at Anderson Valley Methodist Church, and Philo Methodist Church for several years.



Dear People of St. Paul's

Saint Paul's has long been a leader in the spiritual presence of the Des Moines community. We stand committed to providing a sanctuary of peace and welcome to all, whether that be every Sunday morning, an occasional Evensong, or as part of one of the outside groups that call our church a home.

Being effective in achieving the mission of any organization requires a stable financial plan, and the resources to maintain and grow operations to maximize the positive impact on the community. When Perfect Pitch Has Nothing to do With Baseball

On any given Sunday St. Paul's is blessed with a twenty-something baritone who not only sings in the choir, he is blessed with what the world knows as "perfect pitch." Oh, he'll adjust if your middle C is too high or too low and be in perfect harmony. When our organist and choirmaster Mark Babcock changes keys midstream for dramatic effect, Alex knows and automatically (or so it seems) adjusts to sing in the new key. This is not to say he is the only choirister who makes these adjustmentslots more of us are known for having relative pitch and then there are those who claim tone deafness and one hopes they will at least hum along as the hymns are sung.

"Tone deaf" applied to both my mother and mother-in-law. I suppose it is no wonder my daughter Jeannene, their granddaughter, was asked to move her lips but not make sounds in school choir. She was big enough to laugh about it and is today the mother of two children who hear, thanks to cochlear implants and Jeannene herself is manager of the national Hands and Voices organization.

At a recent Evensong I knew I was in a special place when I saw in the program notes the names of two composers, Thomas Tallis and our very own Alex Kane, pictured here.

I know Alex, from the choir, from his singing the Psalms, and sometimes serving as an acolyte Thurifer, carrying a censer spreading incense.

But Thomas Tallis? I am confident no one among us knows him as he was born in Kent, England, January 30, 1504, and died 1585 having become one of England's greatest composers, especially of sacred choral works.

Considering I majored in performing opera and got through years of sight-singing and ear-training at Mannes College of Music in New York, I should be able to tell the difference between what I was to hear from Tallis and then from Alex. Instead I let myself be swept away by each composer's work and in my way chose not to get in the weeds of judging. I can say Alex is more daring, somehow taking the same notes and combining them in more dynamic combinations.

Alex lives in Urbandale where he graduated from high school. A visionary piano teacher encouraged him to pursue music composition and early English literature


at the University of Iowa. A motet he composed was performed while he was still in high school. Today Alex works in fund raising and development at the Civic Center and confesses, "Sometimes I get nuggets in my head and have to get it written down on any scrap of paper I can get my hands on." I take from this that we can look forward to more music creations from Alex, to lead us all in worship.

As a freshman at Oklahoma Baptist University I took a course in sight-singing and ear

-training along with about 75 others. We did it all together and I thought I was pretty good. Then I took the same course at Mannes College with barely a half dozen others and we were required to sing lessons solo. I flunked the first semester, learned to apply myself and had the end of year exam waived. I credit the learning to listen as one of the most valuable tools for what I became — a journalist.
